

# **Enforcement for Illegal Signs**

ave you noticed fewer directional real estate signs cluttering our roadsides? According to county ordinances and state law, off-site directional real estate signs cannot be placed in a public road right-of-way and may only be placed on private property with the permission of the landowner. However, these sign regulations were being disregarded by those contracted to place the signs. Letters, together with photos of the infractions, were sent by GMIA to Supervisor Dianne Jacob's office and Pam Elias, Chief of the Code Enforcement Division.

The appropriate person in the Department of Public Works was contacted and fulfilled the enforcement mission yielding less visual clutter on roadways in the Mt. Helix area.

As for other signs, Code Enforcement Chief Pam Elias says that if you observe a sign that you believe is illegal, you may call the El Cajon complaint line at 619-441-4264. The location of the sign and your name and phone number will be requested. Your complaint will be investigated and a property owner with an illegal sign is subject to fines starting at \$100 and going upwards to \$1000 for each day that the violation exists. A citation is given only after a warning is issued giving a deadline for removal or legalization of the sign. Some signs may become legal if the owner obtains a permit.



For additional information or if you have questions, call Steve Murray, Code Enforcement Coordinator, El Cajon Code Enforcement office at 619-441-4214. If signs are located within the public right-of-way, the County does have the authority to remove them if they represent a hazard. Cases such as this are referred to the Department of Public Works.

### Historic & Prehistoric Cultural Resources in the County of San Diego



Because our Mt. Helix area contains many homes and objects that are considered to be cultural resources, your GMIA board invited members of the County Historic Site Board to give a presentation on how we, as individuals or neighborhoods, could landmark our history.

We found that "cultural resources" can include:

- Something that is associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of San Diego County's history and cultural heritage (e.g. gold mining in Julian).
- Something that is associated with the lives of persons important to the history of San Diego County or its communities.
- Something that embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, San Diego County region, or method of construction
- Something that represents the work of an important creative individual or possesses high artistic values. (e.g. from adobes to mid-century modern).

Something that has yielded, or may be likely to yield, information important in prehistory or history. (e.g. part of prehistoric structure, historic stone dam)

By landmarking a structure, you may be eligible for reduced property taxes or, if it is considered important to state or national history, grants for restoration and maintenance. Also, the building code for restoring historic structures is different from our regular building code. There is a bit more leeway.

We learned that even though a structure has true historical value, if it is not landmarked it can be destroyed. You may be an excellent steward during your ownership, but consider what could happen in the next 50 years. Landmarking will preserve the outward appearance of the structure while still allowing homeowners to remodel the interior to more modern standards. However, with mid-century modern homes or homes designed by famous architects, the interior may be as important as the exterior.

But this is not a simple process. Much research is necessary and documentation is a must. The San Diego Historical Society has a wealth of information on our area. You may do this yourself or retain the services of a professional for that purpose.

Brian Arnold, a member of the GMIA board, and his neighbors are working on landmarking a series of homes and neighborhoods on Grossmont Hill. It is a lengthy process, but well worth the effort to preserve our area's history.

If you are interested in landmarking a house or object, you may contact the Historic Site Board staff with your questions and receive assistance with the proper application forms.

Statistics are available for one year, 92 days at a time. Once you get used to using the site, there is a lot of information at your fingertips.

# Septic System Failing? Nature Knows Best...

hey say that conventional septic systems have one basic flaw—they try to fool Mother Nature! A new concept waste treatment system has harnessed nature's oldest technology which literally breathes new life into septic tanks and leach fields and increases their efficiency - the natural way!

Over billions of years, nature has evolved aerobic (air breathing) bacteria to be the most effective at breaking down and removing bio-wastes from the environment. Septic tanks, buried deep underground and low in oxygen, force less efficient, slime producing, system clogging, anaerobic (non-air breathing) bacteria to partially break down wastes until their aerobic cousins in the leach field can finish the job.

By providing abundant, life-giving oxygen for specially cultivated aerobic bacteria, the new concept offers an opportunity to restore failed systems - which may eliminate the requirement of having an alternate septic site. In fact, a couple of years ago a Mt. Helix residence may have been condemned - it's septic system did not pass muster with a presale inspection and there was no reserve space for the installation of another. The owners looked into hooking up with La Mesa sewer but the costs, long time frame, and uncertainty of annexation were significant barriers in this approach. They found a company experienced in the new technology, aptly named PIRANA, who installed their system

within a matter of days and the improvement was immediate. They were given the option to monitor and feed the system themselves or have a septic company oversee the process. They chose to tackle it themselves and reported success within one month! The system cost them approximately \$5,000, a fraction compared to their other choices, and operates at pennies a day. The quick installation was managed without site damage and with permits issued by the county. San Diego County has approved this approach to repairing existing septic systems.

Many Mt. Helix residents are concerned about their septic systems - lack of reserve space, topography issues, aging systems and the inability for the system to support added square footage. This new technology appears to have the answer to many of these concerns with restoration of failed systems, immediate improvement, providing protection of environmentally sensitive sites, quick installation and low cost.

More than one company provides this new technology; however our local experience so far has been with the PIRANA company. You can find more information about them on their website: www.pirana.biz.

Oh, by the way their slogan is "Nature Called. We answered." Wouldn't it be great if everything were that simple...


