



Annual Dinner Meeting Recap

ur 71st annual dinner meeting was held May 11th at the La Mesa Community Center. The dinner, provided by Abbey Catering, was enjoyed by 116 members and guests. The theme this year was "Roads and Safety Throughout Mt. Helix" and a panel consisting of Supervisor Jacob, Capt. Chambers (Sheriff's Dept.), Brian Pennings (CHP), and a representative from the Department of Public Works answered questions and gave summaries of the status of our roads, crime statistics for our area, and problems with enforcing the speed limits.



- The 94/125 interchange is at the top of SANDAG's "to do" list. (The cost will be \$90-150 million and they now have only \$60 million.)
- The crime statistics in our area are down and a new Sheriff's station in Rancho San Diego is in the planning stages.



Helix Water Rates Update

The Helix Water District proposed a five-tier pricing structure that would have resulted in unfair rate increases to large lot owners and most of us in the Grossmont/Mt Helix community. The proposed rate increases were touted to equal about 21 percent, but typical increases for our community would have approached 40 percent. The Board of GMIA was concerned about the unfair pricing and its potential impact to our community and therefore sponsored a public forum to address the proposed rate structure.

The May 14th forum was attended by Helix Water District Board Members Kathleen Hedberg and DeAna Verbeke, who represent our area, and by about 150 local residents. The representatives listened to our concerns and addressed numerous questions. Due to the efforts of the GMIA board and many of you, and with support from our representatives, the Water District elected to scrap the unfair five-tier pricing system and replace it with one that charges relatively equal rate increases to all users.

The newly proposed rate structure will be mailed by the Water District on or about June 26th with a public hearing set for August 19th. If passed, water bills in our area should increase by about 23 to 24 percent assuming no change in water usage. However, we are in the third year of a drought and GMIA strongly encourages everyone to practice water conservation and reduce your water consumption. \triangle

Alternative Plans for Fuerte Drive

very high collision rate on Fuerte Drive between Calavo and LaRueda has prompted the County Department of Public Works (DPW) to develop proposals intended to improve traffic safety through this road segment. Three initial designs involving widening and realignment of Fuerte and the Fuerte/ Alzeda intersection have been found unacceptable by the local community and the Valle de Oro Planning Group.

DPW is now working on an alternative approach involving improved state-of-the-art warning signs and pavement markings and a minor realignment of the Alzeda intersection.

As soon as the plans for this new alternative are mailed to the local neighborhood community, the Valle de Oro Planning Group will conduct another public hearing on this issue.

Trees of Mt. Helix

Peppermint Tree, or Australian Willow Myrtle (Agonis flexuosa)

his is the first of a series of articles about interesting trees within the GMIA area. Members are encouraged to share their favorite or special tree with others through these articles.

The peppermint tree featured is located in the backyard of GMIA members, Ted and Judy Mackay. The tree was originally planted 30 years ago when the house was built. It was 6' high at the time it was planted, and 30 years later it has grown to a 35' tall by 35' wide graceful weeping shade tree. The narrow, willow-like leaves smell like peppermint when crushed, and small white flowers bloom on the tree in late spring. The leaf fronds canopy over the crown of the tree and have been trimmed to walk underneath. All the deadwood has been taken out of this space around the crown so that the filtered sunlight highlights the reddish-brown and deeply furrowed bark of the branches. In turn the branches bend and curve into unique patterns. This scene is a focal view in the garden. The skirt of the canopy defines a patch of shadowed ground that includes parts of the patio, garden, and dining deck.

At night the Mackays also enjoy this scene using floodlights pointed into the crown. The scene is then available to outside or inside diners through their windows. The tree is within 15' of the pool and is not considered a messy tree, nor its roots invasive. The crown has been trimmed twice in 30 years. The peppermint tree will freeze at 25 degrees, so plant this tree out of low lying areas that experience freezing conditions.

Chicken Ranch Update

he 40-unit project proposed for the chicken ranch property east of Fuerte Elementary School was finally heard by the Planning Commission on May 22nd. (This project was initially filed with the county in 2003.) After testimony from 24 residents, GMIA Board members, and the Valle de Oro Planning Group, the commissioners asked numerous questions of the developer and county staff and seemed genuinely concerned about the negative impacts and the basic incompatibility that this proposed project would bring to the surrounding neighborhood. The outcome was a 5-2 vote denying the project. However, the final decision will be up to the Board of Supervisors. That meeting is scheduled for July 22nd.

It is important to note that the applicant has requested that the July 22nd hearing be postponed to allow County staff and the County Planning Commission to evaluate modifications to the project which Reynolds Communities will propose.

This could benefit our community and the applicant if the modifications include a change to 1.0 dwelling per acre and a project that does not require extension of the public sewer into this area.

Are You Safer "Hands-Free"?

n increasing number of states require drivers to use hands-free units while driving and talking on the phone. Additional states are establishing laws against talking on the phone at all.

Whatever the law, the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (IIHS) says the safest thing to do is to make your phone call upon arriving at your destination.

Early evidence of the dangers of hands-free phone use shows that just talking on the phone reduces activity in the part of the brain responsible for driving by 37 percent. Experts say this is even worse for teenagers, who at most focus 50 percent of their attention on the road.

- Fuerte Drive will not be widened or straightened;
 DPW will work with the community to find alternate methods to make it safer.
- If you witness egregious traffic violations please call the CHP dispatch at 858-637-3800. Describe the violation (time and location), have a description of the vehicle and the license number, and be willing to press charges. These violators will get a visit from an officer.

As part of the business meeting, six directors of the board were elected for a 3-year term: Brian Arnold, Diane Bernal, Allison Henderson, Vern Neff, Mark Schuppert, and Mike Valley.



The Grossmont- Mt. Helix Improvement Association (GMIA) is one of the oldest and largest associations of its type in San Diego County. It was formed in 1938 as a result of community concern for the lack of adequate land use planning and zoning type requirements. It is a non-profit public benefit corporation that represents thousands of families residing in the large unincorporated area of the County that is east of Bancroft Drive, south of El Cajon, generally north of SR94 and Rancho San Diego, and west of SR54/Jamacha Rd. The GMIA area contains over 7,000 single-family residences with a population approximating 20,000 people.

The primary mission of GMIA is to work on behalf of all GMIA community members to ensure that the quality and character of our community is preserved and enhanced. Unlike a typical "homeowners association," GMIA does not own any property

or facilities, nor is it responsible for any property maintenance. GMIA is served by an elected, unpaid Board of Directors and has no paid officers or employees. The GMIA Board works with County and regional governmental entities to help resolve issues that impact our community such as transportation systems, traffic control, planning and land use, zoning, code enforcement, as well as crime prevention and law enforcement.
