

Spring Walk: Saturday March 28th at 10 am, Damon Lane County Park: There is plenty of parking available near the Park (which is south of Fuerte Drive), along Damon Lane or at Fuerte Elementary. Accomplished naturalist and Fuerte Elementary School science teacher, Bruce Wollitz, will lead neighbors on a walk to discover the beauty of nature in our own backyard—focusing on birds, native plants, and invasive and naturalized plants.

What's in YOUR Back Yard?

In the ever fascinating quest to discover interesting backyards in Mt Helix, your Viewpoints staff (all one of us!) didn't have to look further than the GMIA board. Susan Nichols, GMIA's garden tour coordinator, and Diane Bernal, our intrepid traffic and roads committee chair, both have quite the menagerie in their backyards. On a whim 4 years ago, Susan and her family decided to design and build a chicken coop. I believe it's the only coop I have seen with a lovely stain glass window. Once their coop was built, they purchased day old chicks at a local feed store. It takes about 6 months for the chicks to mature and lay eggs and only then will you know whether they will crow or not. Apparently, some breeds can be purchased "sexed" but the Exotic breeds, like the Polish, you just have to wait and see. Susan's hens include: Sultans, Gold Lace Wyandotte, and a variety of Polish hens. They used to have a rooster but the rooster was quite noisy and in deference to their neighbors, Susan sent him to live with some friends who live deeper in the country.

The Bernals are also raising chickens. They have Araucanas, Rhode Island Reds, Bardrocks, Buff Orpingtons, Black Australorps and Leghorns. Their middle-schooler, Charlotte, is primarily responsible for maintaining the coop but the upside to that is her business, "Charlotte's Egg Shoppe," which is adding to her college education fund. From personal experience, I can attest to those eggs being the best ever! This may be due to the leftover bean soup that the hens eat.

Charlotte also raises bunnies that she sells to local pet stores. Currently, she has a Mini Rex and Jersey Woolly. The bunnies can have 3-4 litters a year and each litter can have from 5-11 bunnies. They eat any and all leftover fruits and vegetables in addition to pellet mix.

We are fortunate to live in a semi-rural neighborhood where the zoning allows for some very interesting backyard avocations. If you are interested in starting your own chicken coop, a good online resource is www.backyardchickens.com.







What Have You "Gleaned" Lately?

he Senior Gleaners of San Diego County are volunteers, 55 years of age and over who volunteer their time and labor in gleaning surplus food from gardens, fields, groves and regional supermarkets to supplement the hungry and poor.

The Senior Gleaners, a 501 (c) 3 non profit, was founded in 1992. Started by six retired senior volunteers picking up surplus food at only two sites, the organization now has over 100 volunteers who pick up the surplus food from over 50 sites in the county.

Last year, 65 volunteers worked over 10,000 hours to collect and distribute 390,000 pounds of food to approximately 39 charitable organizations. The gleaned food is sorted, packaged, and shared with social service agencies authorized by their board of directors. Gleaned food cannot be sold by the gleaners or by any of the agencies they assist. Food is provided at no charge for the elderly, the disabled, homeless families or families on low and fixed incomes.

Every van that is driven, every box of food that is sorted, packaged and delivered, each administrative task is performed by a volunteer.

Volunteers are needed to help pick up day old food from grocery stores and deliver it to the warehouse.

Volunteers are also needed to help pick fruits and vegetables from orchards around San Diego County.

The Grossmont- Mt. Helix Improvement Association (GMIA) is one of the oldest and largest association of its type in San Diego County. It was formed in 1938 as a result of community concern for the lack of adequate land use planning and zoning type requirements. It is a non-profit public benefit corporation that represents thousands of families

residing in the large unincorporated area of the County that is east of Bancroft Drive, south of El Cajon, generally north of SR94 and Rancho San Diego, and west of SR54/Jamacha Rd. The GMIA area contains over 7,000 single-family residences with a population approximating 20,000 people.

The primary mission of GMIA is to work on behalf of all GMIA community members to ensure that the quality and character of our community is preserved and enhanced. Unlike a typical "homeowners association," GMIA does not own any property or facilities, nor is it responsible for any property maintenance. GMIA is served by an elected, unpaid Board of Directors and has no paid officers or employees. The GMIA Board works with County and regional governmental entities to help resolve issues that impact our community such as transportation systems, traf-

fic control, planning and land use, zoning, code enforcement, as well as crime prevention and law enforcement.

GMIA invites and encourages all residents in our membership area to become active members and to support the efforts of the GMIA Board to preserve and enhance the character and lifestyle that are currently enjoyed in our wonderful community.
