
I look forward to working with you all and seeing what great things we can accomplish together for our community!

Estrella County Park Project Underway

he San Diego County Department of Parks and Recreation is constructing improvements on a 6.67-acre vacant parcel off Estrella Drive. The project will include trails and a nature-based play area, avoiding and protecting the parcel's environmentally and culturally sensitive areas. Construction is underway on the project, and is expected to be completed in Winter 2020. The project cost is \$893,900.

Free Landscape Makeover Workshops

The San Diego County Water Authority is offering free three-hour online workshops, taught by local landscape design professionals, to give you the skills and knowledge to create a yard that loves San Diego as much as you do. Each workshop focuses on specific landscape topics.

Traffic Roadway Insights

he Mt. Helix area has a unique mix of roads that are either maintained by San Diego County, the City of La Mesa or El Cajon, or are privately maintained roads or easements. So who do you call for a traffic-related issue, such as speeding, reckless driving, illegal parking or an accident?

Regardless of where you live, call 911 for an emergency traffic issue. For anything else, call one of the non-emergency numbers listed below. It's a good idea to know whether you live in a city or the unincorporated area of the county. Remember, just because your mailing address is La Mesa or El Cajon doesn't necessarily mean you live in that city.

The California Highway Patrol handles traffic issues in the unincorporated county areas. However, the Sheriff's Department will respond and then turn it over to the CHP when they arrive.

For a situation on a private road or easement, the CHP should be called. If the situation is on a private driveway, the Sheriff Department should be called. Neither the Sheriff's Department nor the CHP can have an improperly parked car towed unless the legally required tow away signage is posted on the private roadway.

Don't Fall for the Scam!

an Diego Gas & Electric reports that a new wave of scammers is threatening utility customers by telling them their electricity will be



cut off unless they pay their bills directly with prepaid cards.

The scammers impersonate SDG&E's billing department and ask for payment via Green Dot MoneyPak, a way of sending cash via prepaid or bank debit cards.

The scam can be confusing for customers because the scammers may play a recorded message and menu options that mimic SDG&E's official customer service line, which is 800-411-7343.

Remember, SDG&E would never call a customer to ask for payment information during the call, or request a customer to use pre-paid debit cards or cryptocurrencies. If you have questions, call the SDG&E customer service line to verify a call. Don't fall for the scam!

Informed Delivery

id you know you can get an email each day showing you what to expect in the mail? The U.S. Postal Service offers a free service called Informed Delivery that will send you an email each morning (except Sundays) showing greyscale images of the address side of letter-sized mail.

To sign up for the service, go to USPS.com, then go to 'Track & Manage' to locate 'Informed Delivery.'


Create an account and verify your identity to begin receiving the daily notifications.

How to protect your packages:

- Set up notifications to track your package
- Require a signature on delivery
- Ask your neighbors to grab your box deliveries

About GMIA...And What We Do

he Grossmont-Mt. Helix Association (GMIA) is the oldest and largest association of its type in San Diego County. GMIA was formed in 1938 because of community concern about land use planning and zoning requirements. It is a nonprofit public benefit corporation (501c4) that represents about 7,000 families in the county unincorporated area east of the city of La Mesa, south of El Cajon and generally north of State Route 94.

The primary mission of GMIA is to work on behalf of all GMIA community members to ensure that the quality and character of our community is preserved and enhanced, and to foster pride in the area.

Unlike a homeowners association, GMIA does not own any property or facilities, and it is not responsible for any property maintenance. GMIA is served by an elected volunteer Board of Directors and has no paid employees. The GMIA Board works with county and regional governmental entities to help resolve issues that impact our community, such as transportation systems, traffic control, planning and land use, zoning, code enforcement, as well as crime prevention and law enforcement.

GMIA also sponsors annual events to build and unify the community by bringing neighbors together, although events such as the Spring Garden Festival had to be cancelled this year because of the COVID-19 pandemic. We hope to resume holding events in 2021!
