

## Update on Senate Bill 9

### GMIA has Concerns About New Construction

Senate Bill 9, which seeks to expand housing construction in residential zones, is now in effect in San Diego County and across California. GMIA has concerns about the potential effects of SB 9 and board members will be meeting with county officials to discuss its impacts on our community.

Most, but not all, of GMIA's service area comes under SB 9. To see San Diego County's SB 9 map, go to sandiegocounty. gov and search for SB 9. Some sections of the county, such as the Rancho Santa Fe area, are exempt from SB 9 because they have been designated as an historic district.

The law allows homeowners in areas covered by SB 9 to build a second unit on their property or split their lot. To qualify for a second unit under the law, the property must: 1) be in a single-family zone in an urbanized area or urban cluster, 2) provide at least one off-street parking space per unit, and 3) be rented for at least 31 days (no short-term rentals). In addition, the owner must occupy one of the units for at least three years.

A lot split under SB 9 has the following requirements:

- Each new parcel must be at least 40% of the original parcel's size.
- Each new parcel must be at least 1,200 square feet.
- The parcel cannot already have been subdivided under SB9.
- The parcel cannot be split if an adjacent parcel owned by the same owner was split under SB9.
- The lot split must be processed by the county with the approval of a tentative parcel map.

GMIA is concerned about what SB9 could mean for our community. Our concerns about increased density in our community include its effect on fire safety, open space and traffic. We will keep you updated.



# News From Our Neighborhood

#### A Mt. Helix Welcome

GMIA is proud to announce that construction is beginning on a welcome sign to be located at the intersection of Avocado Boulevard and Fuerte Drive. GMIA received a Neighborhood Reinvestment Program grant from the County of San Diego, and has worked closely with former Supervisor Dianne Jacobs' and Supervisor Nathan Fletcher's offices to make this project happen.

The sign is intended to welcome residents and visitors to the wonderful community of Mount Helix. It will have a rock wall base that reflects the historic rock walls located throughout Mount Helix.

#### A HUB for Pickleball

The largest pickleball facility in San Diego opens this month in our neighborhood. Located on the site of the former Mt. Helix Tennis Club in Spring Valley, The HUB features 26 permanent pickleball courts including two grandstand courts with a capacity to seat 400. An inaugural tournament is scheduled for Jan. 13-16, 2023.

Partners Pat Rolfes and Ted Angelo envision The HUB as a branded series of host sites for western regional pickleball competitions. Each member-based facility will feature play courts, challenge courts, leagues for all ages, clinics and coaching, a commercial kitchen and a dining area serving wine and beer. Non-members will pay a drop-in fee for access.

#### Estrella Park Improvements

The County of San Diego Park and Recreation Department and the County Public Works Department will begin a second phase of improvements at Estrella Park. The project is primarily a water quality improvement project that includes underground trash capture devices and bio-filtration basins. Additional amenities, such as enhanced trails, landscaping, and parking, are part of the project.

The county will be advertising for bids soon, and construction is expected to begin in early 2023. GMIA members are encouraged to visit Estrella Park and enjoy this unique kidfriendly space in our community.

#### TIPS FROM A MASTER GARDENER

### Fall Bloomers for Your Garden

t is always a relief for me when the cooler temperatures arrive, bringing the promise of rain. This is also the season for some plants to shine with peak bloom. There are several fall bloomers that thrive in my garden and can tolerate light frost.

Senna splendida 'Golden Wonder' is a lovely small tree or, without pruning, a large shrub. The flowers of this plant are showy and long-lasting, growing to at least three inches across in a rich buttery yellow. While its main bloom period is in the fall, senna splendida puts out blooms intermittently all year. These plants are hosts for Sulphur Butterflies. The caterpillars are green and yellow and hard to find, as they blend in with the foliage, but there are never enough to do any noticeable damage to the foliage. This plant was difficult to get established, but is now tough and drought tolerant. Full sun and well-draining soil are requirements for good growth.

If you only have shade and want to attract hummingbirds, don't despair! Odontonema strictum will bloom in fairly dense shade and produce even more flowers in good sun. This plant grows to about six feet tall and is a strongly upright plant. In the fall, large spikes of brilliant red form in the leaf axils and ends of branches. The flowers do not bloom all at once and will open from the bottom up over a long period of time. Even after the flowers drop off the spike structure left behind is bright red and showy. This plant looks tropical, but it is surprisingly drought-tolerant and easy to grow. Cut it back after bloom for more branches and more flowers. They say hummingbirds can see red a mile away and I do not doubt it with this plant!

Why Dombeya burgessiae 'Seminole' isn't grown more frequently in San Diego is a mystery to me. It is one of the easiest, most rewarding plants in my garden. A robust grower that blooms from an early age, it is smothered in pink bouquets at this time of year. The leaves are large, slightly fuzzy and a greygreen color. This plant wants to be eight feet tall and wide, so I chop it to the ground after it blooms to keep it around five feet. While other plants languish and droop in the summer heat, this one stays healthy and strong with minimal water. It takes full sun to part shade and can be propagated by layering low-growing branches.

In San Diego, the cooler months can be bloom-filled if gardeners take the time to seek out certain plants. My personal goal is to have plants in bloom all year round in Zone 10.

# What to Do With Those Food Scraps

re you complying with California SB 1383, which mandates tossing organic material into your green waste bins? The law is part of an effort to redirect organic waste from landfills back to the soil as compost or mulch.

In San Diego, you can discard food scraps (including meat, grains and prepared food) and food-soiled paper along with your lawn trash. Wrap the food scraps in paper or newspaper, not in plastic or wax paper. For more information, visit the Dept. of Public Works site at sandiego.gov
