She is this year's deserving winner of the Al Platt Memorial Award for Service, given by GMIA to a resident who has worked indefatigably on behalf of our community. The award was presented by GMIA president Anne Krueger at our annual dinner in June.

The immediate past president of GMIA, Kathleen is currently president of the Rancho Helix de Oro Fire Safe Council and the Helix Water District board. She also participates in the Valle de Oro Planning

Group and is on the board of the Water Conservation Garden.

Over the years Kathleen has been active in PTA, Girl Scouts, AYSO Soccer, Little League, and her children's football and basketball teams—earning the monikers "Mom of the Community" and "Mom of the Water." Her social media handle is Mom4H2O.

With all that community spirit and involvement, you could be forgiven for thinking Kathleen is eyeing higher office. But you would be wrong.

"I looked at higher offices. I'm not interested," Kathleen said. "My job is here with the community and in water. It's these local things that really impact us."



A member of the Helix Water District Board since 2006, she was bred for the job. Her father and grandfather were general managers of Southern California water agencies. She is a registered civil engineer and also has a Master of Public Health degree. Kathleen has been a volunteer and/or staff member for numerous water agencies and companies over the years.

Recently, she joined the National Water Resources Association, which works with the federal Bureau of Reclamation. She represents California water agencies, in particular to address the needs of

those served by the Colorado River.

"Southern California does a lot with recycling, conservation, and system improvements. Other states along the Colorado River need to know about these," she said.

Kathleen is the mother of two young adults and is married to Jon Hedberg. She says he deserves a large share of the credit for her activities and successes. He is also a computer engineer, and usually joins her at her meetings, hearings, and other events.

Asked about why she gives so much of her time to others, Kathleen said, "I like to be involved. I like to be busy. I want to make sure our kids and our community get the best."

When the Caraghers moved into the 1½ acre property in June 2020, they didn't know the previous owners, Tere Trout and Jonathan Becker, had hosted the annual swap on their property for many years. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the event wasn't held in 2020. When GMIA approached the Caraghers about hosting the swap in 2021, they were happy to oblige.

"We're grateful that we can share this wonderful property," Wendy said. "We're living the dream and we want to share it."

Their property is lush with flowers, succulents and other plant life. It also features a putting green, a bocce ball court, and a menagerie of chickens and cows who supply the Caraghers with eggs and milk.

Wendy and Ron moved to the house when they returned to San Diego after Ron ended a four-year stint as head football coach at San Jose State University. He previously held coaching jobs at UCLA, University of Kentucky, University of San Diego, and San Diego State University.

isbelief" was Marion Eggertsen's first reaction to learning she had won the 2023 GMIA Curb Appeal Award.

"There are so many beautiful gardens in the Mt. Helix neighborhood," she said. Hers is certainly among them.

Some of the plantings most evident in the Eggertsen garden are Pride of Madeira with its tall, blue flower spikes and several rock rose bushes that bloom with coral daisy-like flowers. Lantana in lavender and yellow provide dazzling color as well as nectar for birds and butterflies.

There are five young olive trees along the edge of the garden and red bougainvillea follows the fence line just below the olives.

The Eggertsens moved into 5115 Mt. Helix Drive in 1959, 14 years after its construction and 10 years after it was featured in San Diego magazine. Marion recalls it was only the second home on Mt. Helix Drive to be built in the Spanish modern style of architecture.

As the Eggertsen family grew to six, another bedroom and a garage were added. But it wasn't until eight years ago that they decided to replace the traditional front lawn with new plantings. Jeffrey Rule, a local landscape architect, led the project.

"We added cacti and succulents throughout the garden and it seems that they take turns blooming," Marion said. "Sadly, we lost several very large blue cacti due to the over-abundance of rain this spring, but the survivors thrived during our hot summer weather."

From their front porch—beyond the giant sentry plant and the beautifully weathered wooden fence—the Eggertsens have a clear view of the San Miguel Fire District Station on Vivera Drive and of the road leading up to Mt. Helix, the site of many happy family memories.

Reflecting on our community, Marion said, "This part of our county, in the shadow of Mt. Helix, has been a comfortable place to raise a family and call 'home.' People walk their dogs along this road and stop to chat. It truly is a friendly neighborhood. I am so lucky!"
