Our very special guest speaker this year is Jim Newland, a California State Parks Department historian, who will present an illustrated talk on the quirky and fascinating history of Mt. Helix.

Even as we sponsor these fun events, GMIA also acts as an advocate for the community. We keep in touch with county and other government officials so we can act quickly to inform the community of issues that affect us. In recent years:

- ** GMIA informed the community when county officials considered using a Park and Ride lot in our area as a site for safe parking for the homeless.
- ** GMIA acted when state officials proposed housing two sexually violent predators in the area. We notified the community and spoke against the state proposals at court hearings, convincing judges that the location was unsuitable to house the predators.
- ** GMIA alerted the community when the California Department of Corrections proposed locating a parole office in the community. Following a public uproar, the Department of Corrections decided against locating the office at that site.

Taking Inspiration from Mt. Helix

oy Davies has climbed Mt. Helix hundreds of times in the 26 years he has lived in our community. He recalls the aftermath of many hikes—sitting on a wall at the top, legs over the edge, savoring the view.

So when GMIA board members Jim Marshall and Susan Nichols asked him to design a new welcome monument at the foot of Mt. Helix, the architect drew inspiration from his own experiences.

"Mt. Helix's sloping stone walls are striking," Davies said. "I wanted to capture that look in a pragmatic design."

In 1933, the State Relief Administration (later renamed the Civil Works Administration) was hired to build the rugged, natural stone walls that surround the Mt. Helix Park and most of Mt. Helix Drive. The stones were shaped and fitted by hand.

The new welcome monument at the intersection of Avocado Avenue and Fuerte Drive is now complete, and it reflects Mt. Helix's iconic aura.

Davies designed it pro bono after then-County Supervisor Dianne Jacob threw her support behind the initiative. Grants from the county Neighborhood Reinvestment Program provided funding, and GMIA board member Tom Huffman worked with Integrated Signs and county officials during the permitting and construction.

The new sign will be dedicated during GMIA's Annual Dinner Meeting to be held June 24.



News from the Helix Water Board

The Helix Water District Board in April declared an end to the mandatory reduction of water use in our region. This means consumers are no longer required to cut back on water use. However, efficiency measures remain in effect, including:

- elimination of runoff from irrigation
- no watering for at least 48 hours after rain
- no watering of turf on public street medians
- use of recirculated water in fountains and water features

The board also imposed rate adjustments for the 2023-2026 period with a maximum increase of 3.9 percent annually. Rates will be reviewed each year.

Kathleen Coates Hedberg, board president, said the Helix board has also advised the San Diego County Water Authority to reduce its projected water rate increase of 14 percent, arguing that it could have "onerous and far-reaching impacts" on consumers and member agencies.



New Student Services Building at Cuyamaca College

uyamaca Community College has opened a \$38.3 million Student Services Building, which was funded by Proposition V, the bond measure approved by East County voters in 2012.

The 36,374-square-foot building is a centralized hub for the college's student services, including Admissions and Records, Counseling and Financial Aid. A Welcome Center is also located inside. Construction began in November 2020, and the building opened this spring.

Be sure to check out the building, which you will pass on your way to the GMIA Annual Dinner in the Cuyamaca College Student Center. If you have a moment, go up to the fourthfloor patio, which offers a stunning view of East County.





Senior Gleaners Seeking Volunteers for Harvest

enior Gleaners of San Diego County, a volunteer organization with a mission to address community hunger, is looking for volunteers to pick surplus fruit as the summer harvest nears.

"Early each year, we get more requests for picking citrus trees than our crews of seniors can handle," said Margaret Burton, Senior Gleaners board president. "We need help to get the food to hungry families before it falls off the trees or gets put into the garbage," she said.

The group also needs people who can haul several filled banana boxes of fruit in their own vehicle. Most deliveries are within 10 miles of the picking site. Most gleaners volunteer one day per week for 3-4 hours, but there are no required minimum commitments. Volunteers join crews working near their communities. Some volunteers form small groups that work independently and set their own schedule.

Since 1994, Senior Gleaners volunteers have gleaned tons of food annually throughout the county. Besides gleaning produce, the group collects unsold products donated by grocers. All the food is provided at no cost to the San Diego Food Bank, Feeding San Diego, churches, food pantries and similar organizations. In 2022, the group collected more than 185,000 pounds of food that otherwise would have been wasted.
