New County Supervisor Monica Montgomery Steppe

onica Montgomery Steppe will soon become the new county supervisor for most of the GMIA community. She will also be the first Black woman county supervisor. She is replacing Nathan Fletcher, who resigned last spring.

Montgomery Steppe was featured along with her opponent at the candidate forum hosted by GMIA and the League of Women Voters last October at Cuyamaca College.

"I have an independent voice," she said at the forum. "Our critical issues are homelessness and housing. I will put our community first."

"Home ownership is very important. We can craft legislation to open home ownership," she said. Referring to our area, she said she wanted to maintain our semi-rural community, and in urban areas, we will have to increase density.

Montgomery Steppe is a Democrat, but she said she has worked for other elected people on both sides of the aisle.

"I'm a fighter and I will fight for you," said.

Update on the Casa de Oro Library

ood things take time, great things take a little longer. Our new Casa de Oro Library is in the works with an updated timeline of Spring 2025 for groundbreaking and opening in Fall 2026. We wish we could wave a magic wand to speed up the process!

The County of San Diego is out to bid for a design/builder for the 12,000 square foot, free-standing building to be located at 9610 Campo Road (across from The Hub pickleball courts). The new library is being built to Zero Net Energy standards. This means the library's solar panels will produce the electricity needed to operate the branch.

Add your input about what you would like to see at the new library. Check out the survey hosted by the County at sdcl.org/newcasabranch. In addition, once the design/builder is selected, we will host community meetings to gather feedback on the facility.

A huge thank you to our donors who attended our November 12 Art on a Sunday Afternoon event. More than \$7,000 was raised to fund programs for children, teens and adults at our library. New Dog Park at Lonnie Brewer County Park

The County of San Diego Parks and Recreation Department has begun construction on a new off-leash dog park located at Lonnie Brewer County Park, which is a five acre neighborhood park on Fury Lane.



The project includes three off-leash fenced areas to separate large dogs and small dogs. The third additional fenced

area would allow for both large and small dogs and would be used as a temporary area when one of the off-leash compartments are closed for maintenance.

The project also includes an

accessible walkway, ramp from Fury Lane, seating, a drinking fountain with pet bowl, and shade trees. For more information, contact Parks project manager Aaron Leon at 858-287-1580.
