After moving here in 2008, Gwen decided she wanted to meet and give back to their new community. She found GMIA through her neighbors. Little did she know that 15 years later she would join the Board of Directors. Gwen is one of the newest board members and she has hit the ground running, well, walking. Last

year, her first year on the board, she became co-chair of the annual January Walk to the Top of Mt. Helix.

She grew up gardening. "My father had a green thumb. Mine isn't quite green. It's more a shade of chartreuse," she laughed. Gwen's father was in the Navy and her family moved to University City in the 70s. She graduated from University City High School and eventually completed her academic career at San Diego State University where she majored in interior design and art.

Mt. Helix-area homes are so different from her childhood neighborhood where almost every house was the same, she said. 
Gwen works for SDG&E in Customer Programs and throughout her career she has specialized in event planning. Her skills are very welcome on the GMIA Board.

Fight the Bite!

e need to work together to get rid of mosquitoes! We need to be sure there is no standing water in our yards. After all the rain this year, there may be little puddles in our plant saucers, toys, rain gutters

and other spots. Mosquitoes breed in stagnant water. If you have a fountain or pond that is stagnant, you can receive free mosquito-eating fish from the San Diego County Vector Control Program. Contact them at 858-694-2888 or vector@ sdcountyca.gov.

Mosquitos don't just bite and itch. Some also spread diseases including West Nile virus, Zika, dengue and chikungunya. The invasive Aedes mosquitoes are now found in San Diego County, and they like to live in our neighborhoods.
