Two Groups Are Better Than One

any people know there are two organizations that protect Mt. Helix Park and the surrounding neighborhoods. You've seen the different signs for events. But do you know how they're different?



THE GROSSMONT-MT. HELIX IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION (GMIA) was formed in 1938 to improve and protect our community. It is a 501(c) (4) organization, which means that although it is non-profit, it can lobby governments to pro-

tect our zoning, code enforcement, planning and land use, transportation and traffic control. GMIA can get involved in issues that protect the safe, semi-rural lifestyle of our community.

For example, GMIA is the organization that led the fight against the placement of sexually violent predators in our residential neighborhood and fought to reduce the number of homes that could be crowded into the former Fuerte Drive chicken ranch. GMIA hosts several community events each year and is probably best known for the Spring Art and Garden Tour. The organization is completely volunteer-run and there are no paid positions. THE MT. HELIX PARK FOUNDATION is a non-profit organization, organized under state law as a 501(c)(3) and their goal is to protect and improve the park that was built in 1925.

Members of GMIA helped form the Mt. Helix Park Foundation in 1999 to save the park from closure. Since then, the Park Foundation has completed several major restoration projects on the 2,000-person amphitheater, 35-foot cross, rock walls, and electric gates. They added hiking trails and restored native habitat to support pollinators and wildlife.

The Park Foundation supports GMIA's annual Walk to the Top on the first Saturday in January. Mt. Helix Park may be best known for the Sunrise Easter Services that have been held every year since 1917. They also host numerous events, including Christmas on Mt. Helix, Nature Day, Pups & Pizza, Astronomy Night, and the famous Food & Wine Festival fundraiser. For more information and to learn more about the history of the park, go to MtHelixPark.org

Fire Protection Information

an Miguel Fire Chief Andy Lawler passed on some website information to help our fire protection efforts. The best site to start would be www.sanmiguelfire.gov which includes, among other information, incident status, fire hazard severity zone maps, disaster preparedness, burn permits, inspections and more. The following websites can also be helpful.

Alert California Live Camera Feeds https://cameras.alertcalifornia.org

ALERTCalifornia has more than 1,144 cameras deployed across California providing a 24-hour backcountry network with near-infrared night vision to monitor disasters such as active wildfires. ALERTCalifornia cameras can perform 360-degree sweeps approximately every two minutes and can view as far as 60 miles on a clear day and 120 miles on a clear night.

Genasys Protect https://protect.genasys.com/search

Genasys Protect is an evacuation management tool that helps communities and first responders more effectively plan and execute evacuations. Here residents can look up their addresses using the search bar and use the zone map to find evacuation information for their area. Users can save multiple addresses and will receive evacuation warnings and orders for saved locations.

WatchDuty Fire Updates htpps://www.watchduty.org

Watch Duty is an application designed to provide real-time updates on wildfires. It provides users easy-to-read maps showing burn areas, evacuation zones, fire cameras and more, all sourced from publicly available data and verified by a team of fire fact-checkers.
